Colonial Pennsylvania Farmstead Calls for Community Support Following Loss of Federal Grant

The Colonial Pennsylvania Farmstead (CPF) announces that its project, "Expanding the Narrative through Community Collaboration: Interpreting Enslavement at an 18th Century Quaker Farm," will no longer move forward under its previously awarded funding from the National Endowment for the Humanities (NEH), due to the federal government's decision to rescind the grant.

The project was developed to uncover and share the stories of enslaved individuals connected to the historic Pratt family farm and nearby Quaker communities in Southeastern Pennsylvania. By partnering with local historians, genealogists, and community organizations, CPF intended to broaden its interpretation of the 18th-century site to include the lives and legacies of those long overlooked in traditional historical narratives.

Although this critical funding has been withdrawn, CPF remains steadfast in its mission. The Farmstead is determined to pursue the work outlined in the grant through other means—but it cannot do so alone. The organization is now turning to the community for help.

"The need for inclusive, research-based historical interpretation remains urgent, and we're calling on our community to rally around us. Your support will ensure that this essential work continues, said Sarah Lerch, Executive Director of CPF."
